





Important Announcement


My fellow LSCC members:


We anticipate newspaper reporters (both numismatic and local) and the local news media being there, so a strong showing of Club members is important!

To the oceans white with foam





Liberty Seated Collectors Club to Unveil Christian Gobrecht Grave Marker


In conjunction with the Whitman Baltimore November show, the Liberty Seated Collectors Club will unveil a new headstone for the Christian Gobrecht family on November 13, 2024, at Lawnview Memorial Park in Rockledge, PA on November 13 at 1 P.M.

Although most often associated with Liberty Seated coinage, Christian Gobrecht (1785-1844) reworked the entire series of U.S. coinage during his brief tenure with the Mint, notably beginning with the Gobrecht dollar with 1836. Gobrecht further contributed the long-running Classic Head gold designs, in addition to the Braided Hair series of copper cents and half cents.

Originally interred at Philadelphia's Monument Cemetery in north central Philadelphia, the remains of Gobrecht and his family were moved in 1956, when the Monument Cemetery property was ceded by the city of Philadelphia to Temple University. Bill Bugert, writing in the July 2008 Gobrecht Journal, detailed his investigation into the location of the Gobrecht plot. The documentary trail, beginning with Monument Cemetery, eventually led to Bugert to Lawnview Memorial Park in Rockledge, PA.

There, Bugert discovered that the original Gobrecht family headstone had been discarded during the 1956 move of remains from Philadelphia to Rockledge, PA. A marker reading simply "GOBRECHT" now marked the family plot, hardly a fitting tribute to the third Engraver of the U.S. Mint.

Accordingly, The Liberty Seated Collectors Club, collectors of Gobrecht's Liberty Seated coinage, has sponsored a new, black granite marker for the Gobrecht family grave, and an unveiling ceremony will take place on Wednesday, November 13, at 1 P.M., just prior to the Whitman Baltimore coin show. The Christian Gobrecht Grave Marker Unveiling is a Highlight for November

A significant event will occur at <u>1 PM on Wednesday</u>, November 13, 2024 at the <u>Lawnview Cemetery</u>, 500 Huntington Pike, Rockledge, PA (Lot 136, Section 3, Grave 97). The LSCC will be honoring <u>Christian Gobrecht</u>, the third engraver of the U.S. Mint (1840-1844), by placing a new grave marker on his grave. All members, and interested historians and numismatists are encouraged to attend the unveiling of the marker.

The Regional team will participate in the <u>Coin-X Coin Show on October 31 – November 2 at the Embassy Suites St. Charles</u>, Two Convention Center Plaza, St. Charles, MO 63303. The Club table will be hosted by Ed Terneus and Micah Uptegrove.

Liberty Seated Collector Acquires Earliest Confederate Note

We normally comment on coins in this space, but, as the Liberty Seated series has close ties to the Civil War, we will digress a bit this month. LSCCer Steve Feller reported, in the October 20 E-Sylum, his ownership of an early Confederate note, a Type 3 \$100 CSA example hand-dated April 5, 1861. This note was authorized under the Confederate Act of March 9, 1861, which specified a paper money issue of \$1,000,000, bearing interest of 3.65%. Interestingly, the Confederate Constitution itself, granting the ability to coin or borrow money, was not passed until two days later. Apparently, funding the government was more important than establishing its own controlling documents.

Note that these emissions were interest bearing. In other words, this was not fiat paper money, as we use today. Rather, these notes passed in circulation as what we would think of as bonds. This particular note (or "bond") was signed on April 5, issued on April 20, and redeemed on June 14. A whopping 55c was paid as interest, reflecting the 3.65% annual interest rate, prorated for about two months. Redemption occurred at the New Orleans customs house. The form of redemption isn't clear (at least to me) but the note might have been tendered in payment for duties.

This particular note was offered by Stack's at the 2016 ANA, lot 10129, and described as:

T-3. Confederate Currency. 1861 \$100. PCGS Fine 12 Apparent. Repaired Splits, Upper Left Corner Replaced.

No. 6, Plate A. This is the lowest recorded serial number of any T-3 according to the census in "Collecting Confederate Paper Money" by Pierre Fricke. It is also the third lowest serial number of all recorded Montgomerys. This example was issued from New Orleans on April 20th, 1861 by N.J. Delaplaine. The note was later redeemed at the Custom House in New Orleans where the sum of \$100.55, being principal and interest, was paid to the holder as seen by the large stamp on the back. A large stamp cancellation is seen on the face reading "CANCELLED BY F.H. HATCHER, COLLECTOR N. ORLEANS." The green tint remains strong on this note despite the level of circulation and repairs mentioned by the grading service. Bold blue stamped serial number 6s are seen at left and right making this a note worthy yet affordable key note for the Confederate type set. From the Old Virgina Collection.

The auction house writeup is somewhat under-described. While factually correct, it misses a significant point. Further investigation by Feller (published in the November-December 2016 issue of Paper Money) revealed that April 5, 1861 represented the first signing date for Confederate notes, and that 19 \$100 notes and five \$50 notes were signed on that day. This information was documented by Raphael Thian in his 1880 Register of the Confederate Debt (note Thian's description of the word debt, again reinforcing the idea that this paper money represented loans).



We now have "first day of issue" status, but it gets even better. First, none of the five \$50 notes dated April 5, 1861 are known to have survived. Next, Feller notes that Pierre Fricke's 2014 Collecting Confederate Paper Money: Field Edition 2014 indicates that only three examples of the \$100 notes are known, with serial numbers 6, 12, and 16. In other words, this piece represents the earliest known issued example of Confederate paper money. At this point, the condition of the note is almost irrelevant, as the historicity becomes the controlling factor. A leading collector of Confederate paper money commented "I'd say that whatever the author paid for the note at auction,

it's now worth considerably more. After all, while we buy coins and notes, we're really buying the story." Indeed. You can expect the next time this note appears for sale, it will receive considerably more publicity!





Comment from Steve Feller:

Len: Thank you so much for your very kind piece on my note. I love the history associated with it. It only took me almost 40 years to acquire it after I was the underbidder!

There is even more to its story - printed in New York (!) it managed to get out before federal officials blocked notes from leaving a bit later on. It was signed over a week before Fort Sumter! Thus, there wasn't a civil war yet when it was signed. There was a Confederate States though.

2nd Known 1839-O GR-3 and NEW die marriage for 1837 Discovered

Dear Editor:

I have announced that advance age and family health issues are causing me to cut back on my Newsletters. As of October 15, 2024, my Newsletters will be emailed every other month rather than each month.

Meanwhile, since finding the 2nd known 1839-O GR-3 in NGC VG10 on June 2, 2024, I have been learning about all kinds of new things including a New Die Marriage of 1837 that I will be reporting in my Newsletter of October 15, 2024.

What is so extraordinary about the NEW die marriage is the fact that a collector (Jonathan) first reported it to me on Sept. 1, 2021 and we could not identify it. Turns out he bought it in a Heritage Auction in 2002 as PCGS AU50. Then on August 16, 2024 another collector who had told me for years that he found a coin in November 1994, finally sent me a photo of his coin on August 16, 2024. I immediately saw that they were a match. Then on October 27, 2024, I found a 3rd specimen on eBay in PCGS AU details (see the TrueView photos on the next page).

At the Long Beach Coin Show on Sept. 5, 2024, I bought only 2 coins, but both were so unusual that I will have to write them up. At that same show, I gave Gary Rosner my 1839-O GR-2 that I found on March 5, 2020 and the (NEW) 1837 half so he could photograph them and return them to me the following week at the Buena Park Coin Show on Sept. 14, 2024. The 1839-O GR-2 photos are now extremely large, and I can now prove my attribution.

However, the 1837 GR-27 photos, although extremely large are not any better than the TrueView photos shown. Just think, I now have the 2nd Known 1839-O GR-2, the 2nd Known 1839-O GR-3 and the 3rd Known 1837 GR-27. That's exciting. Ironically, all 3 die marriages are rarer than the 1853 No Arrows and No Rays half dollar with 4 known, but will never be Red Book listed.

I just don't know when I will be able to write an article for The Gobrecht Journal or the monthly E-Gobrecht newsletter. My first priority is to send out my own Newsletters.

My wife now requires constant attention, and I can only leave her for few hours at a time.

I still believe Bust Half Nuts and Liberty Seated Half Dollar collectors should be collecting Reeded Edge Halves, but I simply don't have the energy to continue to convince them there is a real opportunity here. I have tried to find someone much younger than I am to replace my effort, but no one has stepped up so far. My enthusiasm for Reeded Edge Halves is not for personal profit, but for sharing knowledge, and the excitement of rarity and new finds.

Thank you for your help in the past in getting information in the hands of collectors.
